HAGGAI

GOALS OF THE LESSON:

- 1. Understand the background to the prophecy of Haggai.
- 2. Understand the reaction of God and the people toward the temple.

Introduction: Very little is known about the prophet Haggai. Outside of his own book, his name appears only in Ezra 5:1 and 6:14. The name Haggai means "festive," which is interesting considering the time period Haggai lived. Haggai was likely born in Babylonian captivity. Haggai prophesies in 520 B.C. to the remnant in Jerusalem. The captives had left Persia in 536 B.C. and had been in Jerusalem for sixteen years. Yet during these sixteen years, the temple of the Lord had not been rebuilt. The remnant had receive opposition to rebuilding the temple and had become discouraged. The mocking and ridicule took its toll and the people left the temple uncompleted. Thus Haggai encourages the people to rebuild the Lord's temple.

- 2. In what year did the Persians conquer the Babylonians?
- 3. Who led the first group of captives to return to Jerusalem?
- 4. In what year was the foundation of the temple laid?
