JUDE

1. Author: Several men in the NT bear the name "Jude," a name quite common among the Jews. among the twelve there are two - Luke 6:16, Jo 14:22.

Jude calls himself "brother of James." At the time he wrote this no James other than the Lord's brother was so well known. - Acts 15:13f; Gal. 1:19; 1Cor. 15:7.

Jesus had four half-brothers, James, Joseph, Simon, and Judas - Matt. 13:55; Mark 6:3.

The brothers of the Lord were not disciples during his earthly ministry (John 7:5). Jude was present in Jerusalem with the disciples in Acts 1:14 which indicates that the resurrection of Jesus made his brothers believers— and strong ones. Jude and his wife must have done some evangelistic traveling - 1Cor. 9:5.

(Eusebius quotes the father of church history, Hegesippus, c. AD 150 concerning the grandchildren of Jude and their persecution by the Roman Emperor Domitian, p. 120.)

Strong external evidence caused the book to be accepted by the early church as written by Jude the brother of the Lord, and brother of James.

- **2. Jude and Second Peter:** There are many similarities between these two books. Both deal with the same subject matter, giving similar warnings, and sometimes employ the same words and phrases.
- **3. Date:** Probably late AD 60s (AD 65 70; some say AD 70-75). It seems that by 1John 2:19 these false teachers had already separated themselves from the church. I take it that these were the last two NT books written.
- **4. Recipients:** Many think it was written to the same people to whom Peter wrote.
- **5. Contents:** This epistle furnishes us information about some of the problems which the first century churches had to deal. Jude treats the subject boldly and sternly. He shows concern for true doctrine and right living. True doctrine is the basis for morality, perversion of doctrine for immorality and apostasy.
